Rules and Regulations of Polish Jeopardy: Canada's 150th Anniversary Edition

Participants: persons 18 years and older (born on or after January 01, 1999)

Registration: in order to register participants have to reply by e-mail to the following address: mariaszymanska@mymts.net providing their name, age and contact information (e-mail and telephone number). **Registration date starts at midnight of Oct 03, 2017**

Deadline for registration: October 28, 2017 at midnight.

The maximum number of participants is 9 (nine). If you registered between Oct 03 and Oct 28, 2017 and you were 10th or higher on the list of participants you would be given an option of remaining on the waiting list (your number on the list would be determined by the time of e-mail registration)

The minimum number of participants is 6 (six). If number of registered participants is less than six, organizers have a right to cancel this event.

RULES AND REGULATIONS:

The Board

The “Polish Jeopardy” board is a set of Microsoft PowerPoint presentations, one for each round of Polish Jeopardy (Polish Jeopardy, Double Polish Jeopardy and Final Polish Jeopardy).

The game operator would be responsible for running the PowerPoint game board and identifying the person to indicate that he/she knows the answer).

The Board would be divided into five categories (all questions and answers would be in English)

- Canadian Geography
- Canadian History
- Who is Who in Canada
- Polonia in Manitoba 101
- Polish Culture

Each category would be assigned point value from 100 points to 500 points.

The Host

This person is responsible for introducing the game, reading the categories at the start of each round, reading the clues and judging the answers. If no correct answer is given (different than in host manual), the host is responsible for reading the correct response.

Scorekeeper

This person is responsible for keeping scores for all players. If a player gives a correct answer he/she earns the value of the clue. If he/she answers incorrectly, the value is subtracted from the score.

General Play

A player is randomly chosen to go first, and begins the game by selecting a category and points value (e.g. Canadian Geography for 100 points). The host then reads the clue, after which each player can buzz in. Players have to wait till the clue is read before buzzing in – premature buzzing will not be considered.

The host will call on the player who buzzed in first after clue was read. As in the official Jeopardy game, contestants MUST give response in the form of the question; for example:

Q: This city is the capital of Canada.

A: What is Ottawa? Player has no more than 10 seconds to respond.

A correct response earns the point value for the clue and gives the answering player the right to select next clue.

If the player gives incorrect response or fails to answer in time, that amount is deducted from the players score and another player might buzz in and respond.

If no correct response is given, the host reads the correct response, and the player who originally chose the question maintains control of the board

Players with the highest scores will move on to the second round called Double Polish Jeopardy. Number of players qualifying to the second round will depend on number of participants in the first round (organizers have the right to determine this number during the actual event).

Double Polish Jeopardy

The player who qualified to the second round with the lowest points collected during the first round of the Polish Jeopardy makes the first selection in Double Polish Jeopardy.

There are two Daily Doubles in Double Polish Jeopardy round. Only the player that receives a Daily Double might respond to its clue. This player might wager as much as the maximum amount of the clue on board (1000 points) or as much as he/she has accumulated, whichever is greater, but he/she must wager at least 100 points. If a player has a negative score at the end of Double Polish Jeopardy, he/she is eliminated from the game and cannot participate in Final Polish Jeopardy.

When Daily Double comes up, the scorekeeper should announce the scores of each player. The player that picked the Daily Double should decide how much he/she wants to wager and then announce that wager to the scorekeeper. After the clue is read he/she has 10 second to give response. If a player gives incorrect response, the host reads the answer. No other player is given the option of buzzing in.

Final Polish Jeopardy

Three players with the highest scores from the Double Polish Jeopardy round will move to the Final Polish Jeopardy.

At the start of the Final Polish Jeopardy round, the host should pass out the Final Polish Jeopardy cards. Then the host should read the category and give players 10 second to decide how many points to risk. A player can risk any number of points not exceeding the number he/she already won. Each player should write his/hers wager on the Final Polish Jeopardy card.

Then the clue is reveled and read by the host. Players are given 30 seconds to write their response on their Final Polish Jeopardy cards.

At the end of 30 seconds, players display their cards in turns (beginning with the player with the lowest score) and the final scored are tallied.

The player with the highest score wins.
